ALL EXHIBITORS MUST READ THIS SECTION

How to Exhibit At the Polk County Fair General Rules, Regulations and Directions

All Entries Must Be Postmarked by June 10, 2011

Only Polk County residents can exhibit in the Open Division or Senior Division. Members of recognized youth organizations based in Polk County may enter in the Junior Division. All students, grades 3-12, in schools or home-schooled in Polk County or who are residents of Polk County can enter in the Junior Division Department 35J (School Exhibits).

Step One: Prepare Your Entry Form

1. Determine what you would like to enter by finding the appropriate lot number in the premium book. Remember, youth may enter in either the Junior Division or Open Division but not in both. Adults may enter in either the Open Division or Senior Citizen Division but not both.
2. Fill in the department number, class, lot number and description of each exhibit on the appropriate entry form in the front or back of this book. Please use ink and write clearly.
3. You may enter only one exhibit for each lot number. (Exception: Open Division beef, swine, sheep, dairy goat, llama, alpaca, and horse exhibitors may enter two in each lot number.)
4. You may enter only 23 exhibits. 4-H members in Exploring may only enter 10 exhibits.
5. Cloverbud entry forms with instructions can be obtained from 4-H club leaders and are to be mailed directly to the Extension office by June 10, 2011.
6. Double check your entry for errors and make a record for yourself.
7. Complete the bottom portion of your entry form and complete any stall/pen fees. (See fees chart below) Mail the entry form with payment for the exhibitor fee and any stall fees to the superintendent of entries. Do not ask for any extra stalls or pens. **Entries must be postmarked by June 10, 2011.**
8. Entries for the Open Horse shows are completed on the day of the show (July 30 & July 31).

Step Two: Get Your Entries Ready

1. Be sure to check the premium book for specific requirements (size, method, number, packaging, etc.) for your entry and adhere to these requirements.
2. Animal exhibitors should read health regulations carefully. Animal health papers must be presented before you may unload your animals at the fair.
3. All exhibitors of animals in purebred lot numbers must show registration papers as requested.
4. If you discover an error or need to make a change on your entry form, you must contact the Superintendent of Entries by the change deadline (July 15, 2011).
5. Make sure you have all the equipment and supplies needed for your exhibit.
6. Junior Division exhibitors need to check the judging schedule so that you know which day your exhibits will be judged face-to-face and plan accordingly.
7. All exhibits regardless of judging date must be in place by 7 p.m. on Wednesday, July 27.

Step Three: Bring Your Entries to the Fair

1. **Do not bring exhibits prior to 1 pm on Wednesday, July 27. Fair officials are not responsible for exhibits brought in earlier than that time.** All exhibits must be brought to the appropriate building or conference judging area on Wednesday, July 27 between 1 pm and 7 pm. The following are exceptions to this requirement:
 - a. Junior, Open and Senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15 and 150) must be in place by 6 pm on Wednesday, July 27.
 - b. Dairy, beef and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday, July 28. These animals may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
 - c. Market hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 pm on Wednesday, July 27. The market hog weigh-in is from 7-9 pm.
2. Report to the Superintendent of Entries in the Administrative Building to pick up your exhibit tags and for directions to the appropriate exhibit building.
3. Check tags for errors. Only the Superintendent of Entries may alter tags and judges sheets.
4. You will receive a wristband with your entry tags. This wristband is your season pass and must be worn for entry into the fair park on subsequent days. **Exhibitors who cannot wear the wristband because of health issues or work/employment regulations must obtain an alternative pass from the Fair Secretary.**
5. Wristbands must be placed on the exhibitor's wrist securely.
6. Junior exhibitors need to check the judging schedule to assure they are present for face-to-face and/or conference judging of exhibits.
7. Exhibitors submitting entries and then not exhibiting or attending the fair shall forfeit all stall and cage fees as well as the cost of the exhibitor gate admission ticket. Exhibitors attending the fair may still pick up their exhibitor season pass.

Step Four: Exhibiting and Judging

1. Attach your exhibit tag to your entry and save the bottom portion (claim ticket) for use on the final fair day to pick up your exhibit.
2. Bring the exhibit to the designated exhibit building.
3. Open and Senior Citizen Division exhibitors do not need to be present for judging. Exhibits must be in place by 7 pm on Wednesday, July 27.
4. Junior Division Exhibitors—All of your exhibits must be in place by 7 pm on Wednesday, July 27 even if you must return on another day for face-to-face judging.
5. Report to the judging area with your exhibit on the day and time designated for face-to-face judging. You will be directed on what to do with your exhibit after judging is completed.
6. Animals must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply will be excluded from competing. No one, except exhibitors of animals, judges, and fair officials will be allowed inside a show ring during the exhibition.
7. No pets or other animals are allowed at the fair park unless they are part of an exhibit or are a service animal.
8. Exhibits are to be entered in the name of the owner. Junior division exhibitors may enter and show managerial animals provided a managerial agreement was in effect prior to May 1. Any infraction of ownership rules will result in forfeiture of premiums.
9. No selling of animals (except quality meat animals) allowed until after 4:30 pm on Sunday, July 31.
10. **All exhibits must remain at the fair park until 4:30 pm on Sunday, July 31. Any exhibitor removing exhibits prior to this time will forfeit premiums. The only exception is if a fair official or the veterinarian orders/allows animals to be removed for health or safety reasons.**
11. **You must care for your exhibit during the fair. Failure to feed and water animals and to maintain clean pens/stalls may result in forfeiture of all premiums.**
12. Premiums checks will be distributed in October or November. Please cash them promptly. In the event State Aid for premiums is not received, reduced premiums may be paid to exhibitors.

Overnight Barn Passes

Overnight barn permits will be limited. Youth interested in staying in the barns must register with their leader or advisor prior to the fair. Animal numbers will be utilized in determining the number of youth awarded overnight barn passes. Any changes during the fair must be approved by the Extension Office. Barn permits are issued by the Extension Office and must be picked up by the exhibitor prior to 5:00 pm of the day that the permit is to be used.

Judges and Types of Judging

Judges will be selected from outside Polk County as is feasible. Every effort will be made to engage the most qualified judges.

Open and Senior Citizen Divisions:

Regular judging and placing is followed for these divisions. This procedure is one first place, one second place, one third place and one fourth place regardless of the number of entries in each lot number. Judges are not required to award a placing(s) if none of the exhibits warrant the placing.

Junior Division:

Face-to-face judging procedure is used in many departments as this is an educational focused fair. The exhibitor brings the exhibit to the judge; the judge discusses the exhibit with the exhibitor; and then the judge places the exhibit in the appropriate award group according to or comparing it to a standard of perfection or the ideal.

The Danish judging system is used for all other junior exhibits. This is described in detail in ATCP 160.92(3)(a). The awards for each placing are based on the number of entries in the lot. Judges may award more blue or red ribbons than allowed but the premiums must be paid according to the Danish system. In lots with only one exhibitor, judges are not required to award a placing if the exhibit does not warrant the placing.

Judges are instructed in cases of attempted interference on the part of exhibitors or members of their families with the judges' deliberations and decisions, to exclude parties so offending from competition in the particular lot number.

All protests against awards made must be in writing and signed by the party deeming him/herself aggrieved. A protest must be delivered to the Fair Secretary within 2 days after the award was made. A protest shall include specifications of charges and/or grounds of complaint and the name(s), address(es), and phone numbers(s) of witness(es). The Fair Secretary shall present the protest to the Board of Directors for review, discussion and decision.

Supervision and Liability

The general supervision of the exhibition is vested in the Officers and Board of Directors of the Polk County Fair Society. Exhibitors or others desirous of special privileges must apply to the Officers or Board of Directors.

Careless driving on or near the fair park is prohibited by law.

State Statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced at the fair park. Any exhibitor found in violation of the Statute will not receive premiums earned.

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors or superintendents be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury or death by disease, theft or from any other cause of any character to any property while same is at the fair park or any other time or place. The management hereby assumes no responsibility either as bailee or otherwise for any property being brought or kept on said ground.

If the property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire or from any other cause, they must make their own arrangements and pay for such insurance.

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors, superintendents or volunteers be held responsible or liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by any exhibitor.

The Board of Directors and Officers reserve the full and absolute right to interpret the foregoing rules and regulations, and to arbitrarily settle and determine matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to the fair.

REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

Governing County & District Fair
Wisconsin Administrative Code
Chapter ATCP 160

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

(1) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.

(2) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.

(3) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.

(4) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

(5) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.

(1) GENERAL.

(a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on total premiums paid by a county or district fair, net of any amounts that the county or district fair deducts from total premium payments.

The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair which does not enforce the animal health provisions required under ch. ATCP 10 for all classes of livestock exhibited at the fair.

State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.

(b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.

(c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.

(d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS.

(a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

(c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES

(a) A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets. Stall rents shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall or animal or \$3.00 per box stall for horses; \$1.00 per single stall or animal or \$2.00 per box stall for cattle; or \$0.50 per animal or \$2.00 per pen for swine, goats or sheep. A standard pen for swine, goats or sheep is approximately 64 square feet. Cage rents may not exceed \$0.50 per head for poultry, rabbit or pet exhibits.

(b) Exhibitors in educational and school departments shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES

(a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.

(b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

1. Clothing revue.
2. Demonstrations.
3. Favorite foods revue.
4. Dogs.
5. Small animals.
6. Rocketry.
7. Shooting sports.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements.

A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.

(2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8)

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.04 Junior fair division; general requirements.

(1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. A county or district fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

(2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups, or any other recognized youth organization under adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.

(3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be a result of the exhibitor's own labor and may include a study, merit, or other special project, a skill area or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled.

(4) State aid may be used for the payment of no more than one premium awarded an exhibitor under any one premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except when awarded as part of a group in livestock exhibits or in showmanship.

(5) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid directly to the exhibitor who made the exhibit and not to the school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to inter-school competitive classes. No aid may be paid on education department premiums unless a complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of judges' sheets for the education department, similar to those required in other departments, is filed with the department. All educational exhibits shall be displayed at the fair regardless of whether they are judged prior to or at the fair.

(6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.

(7) Special educational exhibits may [be] established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.

(8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

(1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.

(2) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open division classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by the exhibitor.

(3) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

ATCP 160.06 Senior citizens division; general requirements.

(1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.

(2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

(1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.

(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

ATCP 160.08 Class definitions; individual classes.

(1) DAIRY CATTLE.

(a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

(b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

(c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

(i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2) BEEF CATTLE.

(a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.

(b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(3) STEERS.

(a) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in place.

(c) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth solidly in place and shows no nicking at the gums.

(4) SWINE

- (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A local fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.
- (d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) SHEEP

- (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.
- (b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.
- (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.
- (e) A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit year.

(6) GOATS

Goats may be entered in one of the following individual classes. The age of the animal for determining the appropriate class shall be computed from the opening day of the fair.

Male goats and goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. Does which have freshened shall be shown in the appropriate class under pars. (e) to (h).

- (a) Junior doe kid; under 4 months of age.
- (b) Senior doe kid; at least 4 months but under 7 months of age.
- (c) Junior yearling doe; at least 7 months but under 12 months of age.
- (d) Senior yearling doe; at least 12 months but under 24 months of age and the doe is not in milk.
- (e) Yearling milkers; under 2 years of age and in milk.
- (f) Junior milkers; at least 2 years but under 3 years of age.
- (g) Mature milkers; at least 3 years but under 5 years of age.
- (h) Aged milkers; 5 years of age and older.

ATCP 160.09 Class definitions; group classes.

(1) DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

- (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, and/or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to [be] represented.
- (b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- (c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow.
- (d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

- (2) SWINE. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

(3) SHEEP.

- (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.
- (b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.
- (d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(4) GOATS

- (a) An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year of age, one yearling doe and one doe 2 years old or older, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (b) A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all shall be in the senior age group.
- (c) A junior get of sire shall consist of 3 does under 2 years of age which have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.
- (d) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor.
- (e) A dam and daughter shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

- (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs by individuals who are registered with the department and who have knowledge, training or experience in the specific class or classes to be judged as determined by the department. Judging shall be done in accordance with the requirements of s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (a). In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- (2) Each judge at a county or district fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.

(b) When classes in the junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- (5) If any class of exhibits at a county or district fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

ATCP 160.92 Accounting requirements.

(1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued.

(2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered.

(3) Claims for state aid shall be filed with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, and shall include:

(a) Judging sheets completed according to instructions contained thereon. All entries shall be in typewritten form with the exception of entries in the winning entry column which may be made with a ballpoint pen or indelible pencil. The total premium awarded on each judging sheet shall be shown at the bottom of each sheet. State aid shall not be paid on judging sheets which are not signed by the judge or accompanied by an affidavit of the judge listing the department and classes judged. A separate affidavit shall be required for each department.

(b) Index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name. The total of each index sheet shall be shown on the bottom of the sheet, and the total of the index shall correspond with the total of premiums awarded as shown by judging sheets.

(c) One premium book.

(4) One copy of the annual financial report shall reach the office of the department before the end of the calendar year in which the fair is held. State aid received for the current year shall be included as a receipt in such statement.

(5) Before submitting its financial report, every fair association, society or board shall have its accounts audited by either a certified public accountant, a county auditor, or an auditing committee. If audited by an auditing committee, at least one of the committee members shall be familiar with the records and procedures. The society or board shall submit to the department at the time the financial report is submitted, a statement of the type of audit conducted including the date and names of those making the audit, or a copy of the audit report.

(6) A copy of a financial report as published in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the fair was held shall be submitted to the department prior to December 31st of the year in which the fair was held. The financial statement shall include all receipts, disbursements, accounts receivable and accounts payable in connection with the operation of the fair, and shall show the financial condition of the fair organization before and after the fair.

POLK COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS (2011)

- (1) Exhibitors must provide and use only their own utensils and water buckets in caring for livestock. No livestock watering tanks will be allowed on the grounds.
- (2) Animals should be transported in clean and disinfected cars and trucks to and from the fair.
- (3) All interstate health certificates accompanying cattle, equine, sheep, goats, and swine, that originate outside of Wisconsin, should be approved by the chief livestock sanitary official of the state of origin prior to exhibition.
- (4) Health records must be delivered to the superintendent the first day of the fair as animals are unloaded at fairgrounds. Animals exhibited should be identified by registration name and number or by ear tag number.

- (5) Decisions of the Dr. V.M. hired by the Polk County Fair Society shall be final.
- (6) All open and junior division exhibitors are expected to abide by these regulations as well as the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Animal Health Requirements that follow.

**WISCONSIN COUNTY, DISTRICT, & STATE FAIRS 2011
ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS
SUMMARY**

If a fair or livestock exhibition lasts more than 24 hours the sponsors shall appoint a licensed Veterinarian to conduct a daily inspection of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. The Veterinarian shall review all records and test results required under ATCP 10.87. If a fair or exhibition lasts less than 24 hours, all records or test results required by ATCP 10.87 shall be reviewed by a licensed Veterinarian or by the show chairperson. Records shall include exhibitors name and address, identification of animals exhibited including number, type and description, documentation to show compliance with disease testing and other health requirements, and the livestock premises code, if any, of the premises from which the animals originate.

This is a summary of DATCP animal health requirements for fairs and exhibitions only. These requirements may change due to animal disease emergence in Wisconsin or other states, for example, vesicular stomatitis in the western states. It is always advisable to check the **Wisconsin Division of Animal Health** website for current import requirements when planning to exhibit animals from outside the state of Wisconsin: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/index.aspx. You may also call 608.224.4874 for the import requirements. **Animals meeting exhibition requirements may not meet all import or movement requirements for other purposes.**

The fair and WDATCP have the right to make such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal exhibited and to exclude or remove any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease. If at any time any animal shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be immediately removed from the exhibit and slaughtered or quarantined as directed by the Department.

CATTLE AND BISON

Cattle affected with ringworm, warts, mange or scab may not be exhibited, unless the veterinarian in charge determines the ringworm lesions or warts are inactive and incapable of transmitting the disease. Any cattle found with ringworm, warts, mange or scab that are active shall be removed from the premises of the fair or exhibition.

Cattle originating from within Wisconsin

There are no test or health document requirements for Wisconsin cattle. However, fair management is responsible for maintaining records for 5 years of persons who have exhibited at the fair, the livestock premises code, if any, and the identification of animals shown. Acceptable forms of animal identification for breeding animals are (1) an official metal ear tag, (2) a breed registration number, (3) a breed registration tattoo, or (4) other identification approved by the department. For steers, either an official identification as listed for breeding animals or the ear tag applied at weigh-in may be used. Entry blanks submitted and signed by exhibitors, including one of the forms of identification listed above will fulfill the exhibitor requirements.

Cattle originating from outside Wisconsin

A certificate of veterinary inspection shall accompany all cattle documenting animal identification (see above) and all tests or certifications required. Animals must meet normal Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement.

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for cattle originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison/index.aspx.

Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement.

Cattle from Brucellosis Certified Free herds in Class A states may enter Wisconsin without a prior brucellosis test if the certified herd number and the last test date appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

All cattle originating from Modified Accredited Advanced states, or states that Wisconsin treats as MAA because of diagnosed cases of bovine tuberculosis, shall have a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a current listing of these states.

Cattle imported from states not recognizing Wisconsin's Tuberculosis Free status shall be required to have a negative Tuberculosis test for cattle within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a list of these states or review the department's web site at .

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison/index.aspx

Cattle originating from Tuberculosis accredited Free herds (**except Michigan**) may enter without a prior tuberculosis test if the accredited herd number appears on the certificate.

Cattle originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan** or other states that have areas or zones classified as Modified Accredited) must have a permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the cattle will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing. Each animal attending a fair must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

Cattle from Canada may be exhibited in Wisconsin if they meet current federal requirements to cross the international border.

SWINE

Swine originating from within Wisconsin

All swine shall be accompanied by a Wisconsin Intrastate Movement Certificate stating that the herd of origin has been inspected on the farm within 30 days prior to the exhibition and no apparent disease has been present in the herd for the past 30 days. The certificate must also include all required test documentation.

Swine originating from outside Wisconsin

All swine shall originate from a state classified as pseudorabies Stage V and be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection including official identification and a statement that no pseudorabies vaccine has been administered to the swine.

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for swine originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Swine/index.aspx.

If the state of origin is not pseudorabies Stage V, all swine shall have a negative pseudorabies test within 30 days of arrival at the fair or exhibition or originate from a qualified-negative pseudorabies herd that is qualified by testing 7% of the herd each month, or originate from a commercial swine herd in a state classified as Stage IV or V. The date of the last monthly test must be included on the certificate.

SHEEP

Sheep originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact sheep of any age, and all other sheep 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to attend the fair or exhibition.

Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for sheep originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Sheep_Goats/index.aspx.

All sheep shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. All sheep must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

GOATS

Goats originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to attend the fair or exhibition.

Goats originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for goats originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Sheep_Goats/index.aspx

All goats shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan**) must have an import permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: Each animal attending a fair or exhibition must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import,. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state of origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.

EQUINE

Equine animals originating from within Wisconsin

All equine animals shall be accompanied by documentation of a negative EIA test conducted within the current calendar year and which clearly identifies the equine by registration number, lip tattoos or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine. Documentation must either be an original laboratory report VS 10-11, a USDA-approved electronic test form, a Global Vet Link (GVL) equine infectious anemia test electronic form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection with the negative EIA results listed.

Equine animals originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for horses and other equines originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Horses/index.aspx.

All equine animals shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) and have been tested negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA) within the current calendar year, i.e., since January 1, 2011. The certificate must clearly identify the equine by a registration number, lip tattoo or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine animal. Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if all of the following apply: 1) Ownership does not change while the animal is in this state; 2) the animal remains in this state for no more than 7 days; and 3) the animal is accompanied by a report of a negative equine infectious anemia test from the current calendar year.

LLAMAS AND EXOTIC RUMINANTS

Llamas, Alpacas, and Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Llamas and Alpacas originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for llamas and alpacas originating from other states:

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Llamas_Alpacas_Guanacos/index.aspx.

All Llamas and Alpacas must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have official animal identification.

Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Exotic Ruminants originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for llamas and alpacas originating from other states:

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Exotic_Ruminants/index.aspx.

Exotic Ruminants are required to have a written import permit, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and have official animal identification. A negative Tuberculosis, within 60 days prior to import, and a negative Brucellosis test, within 30 days prior to import, shall be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which is faxed to the Division of Animal Health (608-224-4871) prior to the import permit being issued.

POULTRY

Poultry originating from within Wisconsin

All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

Poultry originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for poultry originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Poultry/index.aspx.

All poultry and game birds entering Wisconsin must originate from flocks that are enrolled in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program in the state of origin. The birds must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent and it must state that the poultry and game birds originate from flocks that are classified U.S. Pullorum typhoid-clean under NPIP or an equivalent program in the state of origin. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

CERVIDAE (Deer and Elk)

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current movement requirements for cervids originating from within Wisconsin and from other states:

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Deer_Elk/index.aspx.

Cervidae originating from within Wisconsin

All Cervidae must be officially identified, be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, be enrolled in a CWD monitoring program meeting the requirements of ATCP 10.56 and originate from an accredited TB-free herd, qualified TB-free herd, monitored herd-tested within 90 days of movement, or the farm-raised deer tests negative on two single cervical tuberculin tests conducted 90 to 270 days apart, isolated and the second test within 90 days of the date of movement.

Cervidae originating from outside Wisconsin

All Cervidae must have a pre-entry permit number from the department and approved by the State Veterinarian (phone: 608/224/4886), official identification, a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and meet Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement (ATCP 10.55).

Cervidae originating from **Michigan** must have a permit and require special Tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4886 well in advance of the fair or exhibition to determine their testing requirements.

DOGS AND DOMESTIC CATS

Dogs and cats originating from within Wisconsin

Dogs over 5 months of age must have proof of current rabies vaccination.

Dogs and cats originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for privately-owned dogs and domestic cats originating from other states:

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Household_Pets/index.aspx

All dogs and domestic cats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have proof of a current rabies vaccination if the dog or cat is five months old or older.. See ATCP 10.80 for specific vaccination information.

OTHER SMALL ANIMALS (RABBITS, GUINEA PIGS, ETC.)

Small animals originating from within Wisconsin (privately owned)

There are no requirements.

Small animals originating from outside Wisconsin (privately-owned)

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for privately-owned small animals originating from other states:

http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Household_Pets/index.aspx.

All small animals shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. Privately-owned animals that are participating in competitions, as opposed to performing and menagerie animals, do not need an import permit. There are no testing or vaccination requirements.

CIRCUS, RODEO, RACING AND MENAGERIE ANIMALS

Circus/rodeo/racing/menagerie animals originating from within Wisconsin

Animals must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. Please see the in-state sections for the appropriate species. Please note: Local jurisdictions may have additional requirements or restrictions.

Circus/rodeo/racing/menagerie animals originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has a page on how to import circus, rodeo, and menagerie animals from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Circuses_Rodeos/index.aspx.

Except as noted, all shall have an import permit from the department. The exceptions are single-species menageries of animals that otherwise do not require an import permit; examples include, but are not limited to, pony rides, racing pigs, and performing dogs. Also, horses owned by individual rodeo participants do not need an import permit. All animals shall be isolated from all non-circus, non-rodeo, and non-menagerie animals at the fair or exhibition. They must meet current import requirements. Phone 608-224-4874 for a permit application. Show and exhibition managers: Please note that this requirement applies to all animals belonging to midway attractions and rodeos.

ADVISORY FOR HOUSING NON-TRADITIONAL LIVESTOCK AND FOR MANAGEMENT OF OTHER ANIMALS WHILE THE FAIR IS UNDERWAY:

The Department makes the following recommendations, but these are not required by statute or administrative rule:

1. Exotic camelids (llamas, vicunas, alpacas, and guanacos) other exotic ruminants and Cervidae are not housed with domestic cattle.
2. Ratites (ostriches, emus, rheas, and cassowaries) should not be housed with domestic poultry.
3. Small ruminants (especially sheep) should not be housed with domestic cattle.
4. Swine should not be housed with other mammalian species
5. Since bovine viral diarrhea (BVD), an infectious disease of cattle, can spread rapidly under the conditions of a livestock show, the department strongly recommends that all breeding cattle exhibited at Wisconsin fairs be properly vaccinated against BVD at least 30 days prior to the show. Exhibitors should consult with their veterinarians regarding the proper choice of vaccine and the correct schedule for its administration..
6. Cattle should test negative for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test and negative for Johnes Disease by the ELISA test.
7. Common watering and feeding troughs should not be used.
8. All vehicles used to transport animals to and from the exhibition, or used at the exhibition, should be cleaned and disinfected prior to and after use for this purpose.
9. All animals found to be afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease must be promptly removed from the premises.
10. Hand wash stations should be provided near all livestock facilities.
11. All fair livestock entry forms should have a space for the Premises Registration Code.

Polk County Fair Livestock Exhibitor's Code of Ethics

Exhibitors of animals in livestock, poultry and small animal shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition.

By entering an animal for exhibition at the Polk County Fair, the exhibitor consents to abide by the following guidelines:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, managerial agreement, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners and exhibitors shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians as required by the Animal Health Rules and Regulations of the Polk County Fair.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the Polk County Fair.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug which could affect the animals' performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, is prohibited. Exceptions will be made for external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics.
9. The act of entering of an animal in the Polk County Fair implies that the owner, exhibitor, has read this Code of Ethics and agrees to abide by these provisions.

Junior Division

Includes 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scout members and any other youth organization having adult leadership.

NOTICE TO ALL JUNIOR DIVISION EXHIBITORS

1. This division is open to all boys and girls ages **8 through 19 as of January 1, current year**, who are members of 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scouts, and Youth Organizations in Polk County. All students in schools in Polk County or residents of Polk County, grades 3-12, can enter in Department 35J. **School work should be entered in Department 35J.**

2. Youth group members may enter in Junior Division or Open Division, but not both. **Youth enrolled in the Cloverbud program in order to be recognized as Cloverbuds must show in the Junior Division. If they choose to show as an open exhibitor, they cannot show in the junior division.**
3. All exhibits must be this year's work of member exhibiting. Members may enter only in projects enrolled in this year.
4. Entries are to be made under name of club, chapter, or organization. An exhibitor entering exhibits under more than one youth organization should complete an entry form for exhibits under each organization. **CAUTION:** An exhibitor may not enter more than one exhibit under any one lot number. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of twenty three (23) entries. Adult leader or instructor's recommendation will be required of each exhibitor by signature on the entry form. A 4-H leader cannot sign for FFA or FHA exhibits and a Ag-Ed instructor or Family Living instructor cannot sign for 4-H exhibits.
5. Exhibitors must turn in their completed entry form to leaders or instructors for checking and signature. The leader's or instructor's signature on the fair entry form verifies that the exhibitor is enrolled in the project (rule 3 above). All entries from a club, chapter, troop or group should be submitted together with complete youth organization summary form.
6. No entry fee will be charged in this division. Each exhibitor in this department is required to purchase only one Junior Exhibitor's season ticket at a cost of \$4.00.
7. **Please do not use pencils, magic markers or felt pens to fill out entry forms.**
8. Junior exhibitors must enter Music, Drama, Dance Revue, Computer Revue, Dog Show, Cat Show, Pet Pals, Cavies, Speaking & Demonstrations, Shooting Sports Event, and Aerospace Fly-Off, on entry form to be eligible for premiums.
9. Exhibits may be removed after 4:30 p.m. on the last day of the fair.
10. **JUDGING:** Exhibitors should check the judging schedules at the end of fair book to see the date, time, and type of judging (conference or Danish).
11. State statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced at the fairgrounds. Any exhibitor found in violation of the statute will not receive premiums earned.
12. Read liability notice on page 10.
13. **Do not bring exhibits prior to 1 p.m. on Wednesday, July 27. Fair officials are not responsible for exhibits brought in earlier than that time. All exhibits must be brought to the appropriate building or conference judging area on Wednesday, July 27 between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m.**
The following are exceptions to this requirement:
 - a. Junior, Open and Senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15 and 150) must be in place by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 27th.
 - b. Dairy, beef and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday, July 28th. These animals may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
 - c. Market hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 27th. The market hog weigh-in is from 7:00-9:00 p.m.
14. Additional breed recognition may be awarded to exhibitor. Opportunities will be posted in barn.

NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK, ANIMAL AND POULTRY EXHIBITORS

1. Dairy, beef, horse, sheep, swine and goats stall rent - see page 7 of this book for amounts (include fees with your entry).
2. Vehicles are not to be parked around barns on Friday through Sunday. Park in designated areas only.
3. Refer to health regulations printed in the front part of this book. Read them carefully and follow them accordingly. Decisions of the fair employed D.V.M. are final.
4. All livestock must be owned or under managerial contract by the exhibitor since May 1 of this year. Animals must be shown by person who made the entry. In case of emergency, contact superintendent for permission to get a substitute showman.
5. All animals must be trained to lead and be under control of exhibitor or they will not be permitted in the show ring.
6. Any exhibitor not caring for livestock exhibit(s) shall be disqualified by the fair superintendents and/or directors from receiving premium money.
7. Club Herdsmanship awards will be given to dairy, beef, swine, sheep and horse. Judging will be based on originality, cleanliness, responsible animal care and exhibitor courtesy.

Exhibitors are prohibited from bringing extra fans or generators into the barns

The clipping and grooming of dairy animals by exhibitors while on the fairgrounds is to be done by the exhibitor and can be assisted by immediate family members, including Polk County 4-H Dairy leaders, and/or FFA advisor, or owner. All animals entering the judging ring must be shown by a junior exhibitor.

REGISTRATION PAPERS WILL BE CHECKED AT THE FAIR

All exhibitors showing purebred animals must submit all pedigree and identification information for each purebred animal to be shown with their fair entry form on the supplemental form provided. Exhibitors of grade animals must submit as much identification and pedigree information as known. This information is essential for the dairy show catalog. **Any changes must be completed by the change deadline—July 15, 2011. This includes changes or completion of pedigree and identification information for purebred classes.** The dairy committee reserves the right to verify that the correct animal is exhibited as entered. NO substitutions allowed after the change deadline.

A Spring Calf is one born during the period March 1, 2011 to May 1, 2011.

A Winter Calf is one born during the period December 1, 2010 and February 28, 2011.

A Fall Calf is one born during the period September 1, 2010 to November 30, 2010.

A Summer Yearling is one born during the period June 1, 2010 to August 31, 2010.

A Spring Yearling is one born during the period March 1, 2010 and May 31, 2010.

A Winter Yearling is one born during the period December 2, 2009 and February 28, 2010.

A Fall Yearling is one born during the period September 1, 2009 and November 30, 2009.

A Junior 2 Year old is one born during the period March 1, 2009 to August 31, 2009. Yearlings that have freshened should be entered in this lot number.

A Senior 2 Year old is one born during the period September 1, 2008 to February 28, 2009.

A 3-4 Year old is one born during the period September 1, 2007 to August 31, 2008.

A 4-5 Year old is one born during the period September 1, 2006 to August 31, 2007.

A 5 Year old and over is one born before September 1, 2006.

Any dry cow must have completed at least one lactation.

Attention Exhibitors of Milking Cows: The milking facilities at the Polk County fair park are provided for your use and convenience. These facilities have been paid for and are maintained through proceeds from the sale of milk produced during the county fair each year. Other improvements to the dairy exhibit area at the fair park are also made using these funds. ATCP60.12(2) prohibits milk from being transported from the fair park back to a farm. This rule is designed to protect the quality and safety of milk.

Best Uddered Cows: A rosette ribbon will be awarded to the best uddered cow in each milking cow lot number when cows in that lot are shown. Dry cows are not eligible for this ribbon.

Cash awards will be presented to selected dairy champions. These awards will be announced the day of the dairy show. Special thanks to the agribusinesses that have generously supported this effort.

GUIDELINES, RULES AND PROCEDURES 2011 POLK COUNTY QUALITY MEAT PROGRAM

1. Any 4-H, FFA, of FCCLA, Scout member, or any other organized youth group member 10 through 19 years of age as of January 1, 2011 enrolled in the beef, pork or sheep production project or enterprise may participate. All exhibitors must complete a fair entry form for Quality Meats animals.
2. A 4-H, FFA, or FCCLA, Scout member, or any other organized youth group member may sell only one animal at the auction.
3. A member may enter more than one species; all entries must be weighed at the fair. The animal to be sold must be selected after judging is completed or by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, July 29, 2011.
4. A sale commission of 4% will be charged to cover program expenses and improvements to the Polk County Fair.
5. No drugs may be administered to animals at the fair or prior to the fair that would cause meat to be condemned. All withdrawal periods must be adhered to including administered medications and medicated feed. The exhibitor will not be paid for the animal if it is condemned.
6. A maximum of eighty-eight (88) animals will be sold. A maximum of thirty-three (33) steers will be allowed to sell. Eighteen (18) lambs, thirty-five (35) hogs, and two (2) goats will be sold. If there should be a shortage in hogs, steers or lambs, it will be made up from one of the other at the discretion of the Quality Meats committee. The judge's rank in the show will be used to determine eligibility to sell hogs, lambs steers and goats. Steers, hogs and lambs will be intermixed by drawing sale order numbers at fair weigh-in. Decision of judge is final.
7. Animals will be allowed to cross the scale only once at the fair weigh-in. All entrants must turn in feed record and information sheets at that time. These sheets will be required for participation in the sale. Drug withdrawal sheets must be submitted at final weigh-in.
8. **All animals must be trained to handle at fair time or will be disqualified.**
9. Once an animal is sold, it becomes the property of the buyer. However, the exhibitor has the responsibility of caring for the animal until it leaves the fair park. All animals are to remain in the barns until specified loading time (not before 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 31, 2011).
10. An exhibitor shall be determined ineligible to be in the Polk County Quality Meat Program if entered in a similar neighboring county fair Quality Meat Program.

11. An exhibitor wishing to withdraw their animal from the auction sale must inform the Quality Meat Committee by 4 p.m. on Friday, July 29, 2011. The auction sale will be Saturday, July 30, 2011 at 6:00 p.m.
12. **All exhibitors are required to help set-up and tear-down the auction ring.**
13. All animals entering the sale ring must be sold at the sale and must be slaughtered at the designated locker plant and entered in the carcass contest.
14. All carcasses will be evaluated for quality meat by using accepted carcass contest data.
15. All carcasses will be available for viewing at an educational meeting at the designated locker plant on the Thursday following the end of the fair. The meeting will include a carcass judging contest for any 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scout member or any other organized youth group member. The carcass judging contest will include a class of 4 steer carcasses, a class of 4 lamb carcasses and a class of 4 hog carcasses. The highest placing contestant will receive a trophy.
16. The Polk-Burnett Bankers Association will clerk the sale.
17. **All trophy winners must make weight, grade and be sold at the sale.**
18. Trophies or plaques will be presented to the following Sale Animals:
 - Buyer of the Sale Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Sale Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Sale Reserve Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Carcass Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Reserve Grand Champion of each species
 - Buyer of the Carcass Grand Champion of each species
 - Carcass judging contest winner
 - Exhibitor of the ADG Champion of beef, sheep and swine
 - Exhibitor of the ADG Reserve Champion of beef, sheep and swine
 - Exhibitor of the Total Performance Champion of beef, sheep and swine
 - Exhibitor of the Total Performance Reserve Champion beef, sheep and swine
19. The Total Performance Champion of beef, sheep, and swine will be determined by adding the live animal placing, the Carcass placing, and the average rate of daily gain placing for each animal. In case of a tie, the animal with the highest carcass placing will be the winner.
20. **Any exhibiting family must submit the names of a minimum of 2 prospective buyers that were not buyers at the previous year's sale, and obtain their signatures. The Quality Meats Committee will provide appropriate forms for these signatures. Signature forms must be submitted at the final weigh-in at the fair. If the forms are not completed the exhibitor will not be able to sell their animal in the auction.**

Each exhibitor will be provided with a list of names of all exhibitors in the project. These listings can be distributed to potential buyers. No coercion is to be used. A congenial relationship should be developed.
21. **All exhibitors selling an animal should use appropriate means to express appreciation to the buyer regardless of price received. The committee strongly recommends a thank you letter or an ad in the newspaper. All exhibitors should add the buyer's name to their exhibitor's stall card.**
22. The scale and all equipment owned by this program group can only be used for the Polk County Quality Meats Program.
23. Families with more than one member in the project may weigh in a designated family plan animal provided no member has weighed in more than one animal per species. Each family plan animal must be assigned to an individual exhibitor by the end of the weigh-in on entry day of the county fair.
24. **Exhibitors are required to attend two educational events sometime during the year between the end of the previous fair and the current fair weigh-in**

STEERS

1. Steers are weighed and tagged the first Saturday in December at the fair park in St. Croix Falls from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.
2. **Steers should be reasonably halter-broken at the December weigh-in.**
3. **All steers must be dehorned (including scurrs) and castrated by the December weigh-in.**
4. Only steers born before January 1, 2010 are eligible. Steers may be mouthed at weigh-in at the fair to determine age.
5. **Exhibitor will be allowed to weigh and tag two (2) steers in December. If tag is lost, contact the Polk County Extension Office IMMEDIATELY for tag replacement.**
6. All steers will be weighed in at the county fair on Thursday of the fair at the designated time.

9. The order for loading steers for transportation to the locker plant will be in reverse of the sale order. (Last steer sold is the first steer loaded). This order will be announced at the sale. This order will be followed to prevent injury to animals, exhibitors and bystanders during the loading process.
10. All market steers will be ranked by a judge for total performance points.

HOGS (barrow or gilt)

1. Barrows and gilts are to be weighed and identified by tag (provided by the Quality Meat Committee) in April at the fair park. Date will be announced. The weigh-in will be between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. No more than two (2) hogs are to be tagged per exhibitor at the April weigh-in. **If the tag is lost, contact the Polk County Extension Office IMMEDIATELY for replacement.**
2. Maximum weight for hogs at the April weigh-in is 100 pounds.
3. Hogs must grade No. 1 or No. 2 to be eligible to be sold.
4. Hogs must weigh 225 pounds or more to be eligible to be sold.

All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (Michigan) must have an import permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state or origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: Each animal attending a fair or exhibition must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608.224.4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state of origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.

HORSE BARN RULES TO BE POSTED

1. NO SMOKING, profanity or alcoholic beverages.
2. Aisles are to remain clean, no tack or cleaning equipment in stalls.
3. No running in barn.
4. **NO RIDING OF HORSES IN BARN - LEAD HORSE TO AND FROM SHOW RING.**
5. Horses and stalls must be clean at all times - bring fork, shovel, etc.
6. Each exhibitor may decorate their horse's stall – decorations must be taken down at the end of the fair.
7. All exhibitors should comply with herdsman ship guidelines – judging will be done daily – cleanliness, sportsmanship, decorating.
8. You must bring own hay, grain and bedding for your horse.
9. No one is allowed to sleep in the horse barn.
10. One horse per stall - no suckling foals in barn.
11. No horse should be beyond horse barn except when washing.
12. Any **UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT** by an exhibitor or guardian will result in dismissal from remaining horse events at the fair, and loss of premiums.
13. You may be asked to leave by the barn superintendent if the horse barn rules are not followed.
14. Stall deposits will be returned by mail after the fair IF the horse has remained at the fair until 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, AND the stall has been cleaned..

Horse Show Rules

1. Grade of exhibitor is as of January 1, 2011.
2. NO DOGS ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS DURING THE FAIR, INCLUDING IN THE CAMPING AREA
3. No one other than the junior exhibitor should ride their horse (parents, trainers, other kids, etc., are not allowed to ride).
4. Stallions foaled before January 1, 2011 are not allowed.
5. Suckling foals will be allowed in the show ring only when being shown. When not being shown, they must be tied or confined.
6. Strap on spurs are optional. Slip on spurs are not allowed. No whips will be allowed in Showmanship (English or Western).
7. Refer to USEF rulebook for details regarding rules and dress code. Go to: <http://www.usef.org/documents/ruleBook/2009/27-WS.pdf>
8. For gymkhana rules, go to: http://4h.uwex.edu/events/documents/09_Gymkhana_Booklet.pdf.
9. Exhibitors may show a maximum of two horses, but no more than one horse per lot number.
10. A horse may be used only once in any class at the show (grade levels are considered class divisions and not separate events). Exceptions to this rule are horses used in the horseless horse project, or a horse used in showmanship by two exhibitors of the same family.

11. All judged events qualify for the State Horse Expo EXCEPT Novices classes and Walk/Trot Classes. To qualify for the State Horse Expo, exhibitor must receive a blue at the county fair in a qualifying class, and be in the sixth grade or older. (There are no age limits for the educational classes at the State Horse Expo).
12. To show at the District Gymkhana, exhibitor must have met requirements to show at the fair, but do not have to qualify.
13. To show at the State Gymkhana, exhibitor must have met requirements to show at the fair and be in the sixth grade or older.
14. Walk/Trot classes are for those exhibitors who are not comfortable loping. If the horse/rider combination has won a blue ribbon in walk/trot at a previous fair, they should be in a loping class.
15. If an exhibitor is entered in a walk/trot class, they may not enter in a loping class.

Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum for other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

Poultry originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for poultry originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Poultry/index.aspx. All poultry and game birds entering Wisconsin must originate from flocks that are enrolled in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program in the state of origin. The birds must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent and it must state that the poultry and game birds originate from flocks that are classified U.S. Pullorum typhoid-clean under NPIP or an equivalent program in the state of origin. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

NOTICE: There will be NO testing done at the fair, to stay in compliance with the state regulations. Please have your birds tested prior to the start of the fair. No birds will be admitted without proper documentation.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (Michigan) must have an import permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: Each animal attending a fair or exhibition must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import,. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state of origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.

BUILDING MODELS

Examples of kits that can be used, AMA Cub, Thermal Dart, Delta Dart, Pigeon, Flip. All rocket models must have individually attached fins, Estes Model Rocket Kits and/or Quest Model Rocket Kits are used in this section. Each model entered must be identified with the name of the exhibitor and the year built (permanent). Airplanes and rockets should have a stand, when displayed at the fair, to prevent breakage, and to make better use of display area.

All models under aerospace categories must be displayed at the Polk County Fair to receive premiums, unless excused by 4-H Agent Chuck Prissel. **All lot numbers must be entered on fair entry form to be eligible for premiums.** Showmanship models do not have to be the ones flown at contest. Premiums are identical for all aerospace lot numbers. For questions, contact Chuck Prissel, 4-H Youth Development Agent, at 485-8600.

For model rocket launching, each exhibitor will be allowed 2 launches for each lot number. The best launch will determine ribbon placing and premiums.

I. FLIGHT PERFORMANCE CATEGORY

To get ribbons and premiums in lot numbers 1-17 and 23-28, flying and launching sessions will be held at Polk County Fair Park on Saturday, June 25th at 8:30 a.m.; and July 9th at 8:30 a.m.; for rockets and airplanes. Championship session is July 23rd at 8:30 a.m. Registration at 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. Flying and judging will follow, must register to fly. If you have questions, contact Tim Moore – 715.485.9319; or P. Jay Rivard – 715.246.5720..

To qualify for the championship model airplane and model rocket fly-off in lots 1-17 you must fly three categories: hand launch, catapult launch, and rubber powered. Lots 23-28 must fly two categories: target accuracy and parachute duration, an exhibitor must have attended one of the first two sessions and earned at least one blue ribbon in any of the model airplane or model rocket lot numbers from 1-17 and 23-28.

Lot numbers 1-17 - are for flying model airplanes. Judging will be according to time in air (duration) after a model is released from the exhibitor's hand or from a tow line - (free flight only). At least one attempt must be made to qualify for a ribbon and premiums in each lot number. NOTE: The same glider can be used in both hand launch and catapult flying. Also a rubber powered model can be used in both hand launch and R.O. G. (Rise Off Ground). Equipped with a landing gear, (gear can be removed for the hand launch flights). Wingspan is wing tip to wing tip. Ready to fly models are not allowed. A green ribbon will be awarded for times that are double the requirement for a blue ribbon.

Lot numbers 23-27 - are for model rocket launching for accuracy. Judging is based on the following: Safety - 25 points; Construction, 25 points; Launching, 25 points; Recovery deployment, 25 points; and Launch accuracy, 100 points. One point will be subtracted from 100 for each foot a rocket lands away from either the launch pad or the outer edge of a randomly placed target bulls eye, (10 foot radius). Best 1 of 2 launches. All target rocket to deploy at last 10 feet above the ground, determined by the judge.

Scoring for Ribbons:

Blue – 150-200 points; Red 100 – 149 points; White – 50 – 99 points; Pink – less than 50 points. A green ribbon will be awarded for a bulls eye.

At the championship session:

Model airplane flyers will be allowed two attempts to accomplish their best single time in each of three categories: hand launch gliders, catapult gliders and a rubber powered model of their choosing. Their best total time in the three categories will determine their placing for champion.

Model rocket launchers will only be allowed one official launch in each of the two categories: target accuracy and parachute duration. The combined points on the two categories will determine their placing for champion. A first year and advanced champion will be crowned in both model aero plane flying and model rocket launching. Showmanship:

Points are based on you and your projects appearance, and your knowledge of the project.

POLK COUNTY REVISED STANDARDIZED RECIPES

DIRECTIONS: The 4-H Foods Committee recommended using standardized recipes to make the county fair judging more uniform and fair. These recipes can be used for fair book items numbered 1-18.

1. Muffins, Plain

- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 egg, beaten

Combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar in medium bowl. Mix well. In a large measuring cup, measure milk. Add butter. Add egg and beat with a fork. Add to dry ingredients. Stir only until well moistened. Spoon into greased muffin tins, filling two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Serve hot with butter. Makes 12 muffins.

2. Muffins, Blueberry

Follow No. 1. - Muffins, plain except increase sugar to 1/2 cup and fold in 1/2 to 1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries.

3. Muffins, Banana-Bran

Follow No. 1. - Muffins, plain except reduce flour to 1 1/2 cups and add 1 cup bran flakes and 1/2 cup mashed banana. Use brown sugar.

4. Cookies, Chocolate Chip

1/3 cup shortening
1/3 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 package (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Heat oven to 375 degrees. In a large bowl, cream together shortening, butter, sugars, egg and vanilla. Stir in flour, soda and salt. Mix in chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoonfuls 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake about 8-10 minutes or until light brown.

5. Cookies, Peanut Butter

1 cup peanut butter
1 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix shortening, sugars, peanut butter and eggs. Add vanilla; mix. Add sifted dry ingredients and mix well. Roll about a tablespoon of dough into a ball and press down with a fork. Bake at 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes.

6. Cookies, Spritz

1 cup soft butter
2/3 cup sugar
3 egg yolks
1 teaspoon flavoring (almond or vanilla)
2 1/2 cups flour

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Mix butter, sugar, egg yolks and flavoring thoroughly. Measure and work in flour. Using one-fourth at a time, force dough through cookie press onto ungreased baking sheet in desired shapes. Bake 7 to 10 minutes, or until set but not brown. Makes about 6 dozen cookies.

7. Cookies, Sugar

1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup cooking oil
1 cup white sugar
1 cup powdered sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 1/4 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cream of tartar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat first four ingredients very well with an electric mixer. Add one egg at a time and beat well after each. Add flour and other ingredients. Mix well. Make balls the size of a walnut and roll in white sugar. Press lightly on cookie sheet with glass dipped in sugar. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are slightly brown.

8. Brownies, Unfrosted

- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 10 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream shortening & sugar. Add unbeaten eggs & mix well. Add vanilla, sifted flour, cocoa, & salt. Spread in a well-greased 9"x13" pan & bake for 30 minutes. Cool & cut into squares.

9. Baking Powder Biscuits, Rolled

- 2 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup milk

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Measure flour and mix dry ingredients well in bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until mixture looks like "meal". Stir in almost all the milk. If dough does not seem pliable, add enough to make a soft, puffy dough easy to roll out. (Too much milk makes dough sticky, not enough makes biscuits dry.) Round up on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Knead lightly 20 to 25 times. Handle lightly.

Roll dough or pat out (with floured hands) to about 1/2" thick. Cut close together with floured biscuit cutter. Fit leftover bits together. Do not re-knead. Pat out dough, roll smooth and cut as desired. Place close together for biscuits with soft sides, an inch apart for biscuits with crusty sides, on ungreased baking sheet. Place in middle of oven. Bake 10 to 12 minutes. Serve hot. Makes 20 1 3/4" biscuits (1" high).

10. Cake, Angel Food

- 1 cup cake flour
- 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar (granulated)
- 1 1/2 cups egg whites (12)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup sugar (granulated)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Have ready a tube pan, 10"x4", but do not grease. Measure flour by dip-level-pour method or by sifting. Stir flour and first amount of sugar together to blend. Measure egg whites, cream of tartar and salt into large bowl. Beat until foamy. Gradually add second amount of sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time. Continue beating until meringue holds stiff peaks. Fold in flavorings. Sprinkle flour-sugar mixture over meringue. Fold in gently, just until the flour-sugar mixture disappears. Push batter into ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Gently cut through batter. Bake 30 to 35 minutes. Invert on a funnel. Let stand until cool.

11. Cake, Sponge

- 1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 egg yolks (about 1/2 cup)
- 1 1/2 cups sugar (granulated)
- 1/3 cup cold water
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 teaspoon lemon flavoring
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, if desired
- 6 egg whites (3/4 cup)
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Sift, flour, baking powder, and salt together; set aside. Beat egg yolks in a small mixer bowl until very thick and lemon-colored. Pour beaten yolks into large bowl and beat in sugar gradually. Beat dry ingredients in alternately (slowly, on low speed) with water, flavorings, and rind. In large bowl, beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff. Gradually and gently fold egg yolk mixture into beaten whites. Pour into ungreased tube pan, 10" x 4". Bake 60-65 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Turn pan upside down with tube over neck of funnel or bottle. Cool. Remove from pan.

12. Cake, Quick Coffee Cake with Streusel Topping

Sift together:

2 cups sifted flour

1 cup sugar

3 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

Add:

1/3 cup soft butter or margarine

1 egg

1 cup milk

Beat two minutes and pour into greased 9" pan. Cover with streusel topping. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. Serve warm.

Streusel Topping

2 tablespoons hard butter or margarine

1/4 cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon

2 tablespoons flour

Cut in ingredients with a fork.

13. Bread, Banana

1/2 cup shortening

1 cup brown sugar

2 eggs

2 bananas (mashed), 1 1/4 cups

2 cups sifted flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening: add sugar gradually and cream well. Add eggs, one at a time. Add mashed bananas, and sifted dry ingredients. Pour into greased, 5 3/4" x 3 x 2 1/2" bread pans. Bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees.

NOTE: Use ripe bananas for best results.

14. Bread, Pumpkin

1 3/4 cups flour

1 teaspoon soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon cloves

1/2 teaspoon allspice

1/3 cup water

1 cup pumpkin (cooked and sieved or canned)

1 1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup oil

2 eggs

Beat eggs, oil, and sugar; stir in water and pumpkin. Sift together dry ingredients separately. Stir into pumpkin mixture until thoroughly mixed. Pour into greased bread (large) pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 60-70 minutes. Makes one large loaf (9x5x3) or 3 small loaves (5 3/4x3x2 1/2). Bake small loaves 45-50 minutes.

15. Bread, Zucchini
 3 teaspoons vanilla
 3 eggs
 1 cup oil
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 3 teaspoons cinnamon
 3 cups flour
 1 cup sugar
 2 cups grated zucchini

Beat eggs, oil, sugar until thick and foamy. Stir in vanilla and zucchini. Combine dry ingredients in another bowl. Stir into zucchini mixture until well blended. Pour into 1 9x5x3 loaf pan or three 5 3/4 x 3 x 2 1/2 inch pans that have been greased. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour. Cool 10 minutes before turning out.

16. Dinner Rolls, Yeast, Any shape - Sweet Roll Dough

- 1/4 cup warm water (not hot - 100 to 115 degrees)
 1 package active dry yeast
 3/4 cup lukewarm milk*
 1/4 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 egg
 1/4 cup soft shortening
 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 cups flours

*Scald milk, then cool to lukewarm to destroy enzymes which make dough sticky and hard to handle.

In bowl, dissolve yeast in water. Add milk, sugar, egg, salt, shortening, and half of flour to yeast. Mix with spoon until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to handle easily. Turn onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth (5 minutes). Round up in greased bowl, bring greased side up. Cover with cloth. Let rise in warm place (85 degrees) until double, about 1 1/2 hours. (If kitchen is cool, place dough on a rack over a bowl of hot water and cover completely with a towel). Punch down; let rise again until almost double, about 30 minutes. Shape, let rise and bake as directed in specific recipes.

Old Fashioned Dinner Rolls

Form dough into balls 1/3 size desired. Place close together in a greased round pan.



Cloverleaf Rolls

Form bits of dough into balls about 1" in diameter. Place 3 balls in each greased muffin cup.

Crescents (Butter horns)

Roll dough about 1/4" thick into a 12" circle. Spread with soft butter. Cut into 16 pie-shaped pieces. Beginning at rounded edge roll up. Place on pan, point underneath.



Picnic Buns

Roll dough into a 7 1/2" square, 1/2" thick. Cut into 9 buns, each 2 1/2" square. Place on greased sheet. Let rise until double. Bake 12 to 15 minutes.

Twists

Twist strip of dough into a figure 8, but give strip additional twist just before placing it on sheet.



Knots

Twist and tie each strip into a knot. Press ends down on greased sheet.

17. Cinnamon Rolls

Use Sweet Roll dough recipe. After dough rises, roll the dough into an oblong, 15"x 9" rectangle. Spread with 2 tablespoons softened butter and sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Roll the dough up tightly, beginning at wide side. Seal well by pinching edges of roll together. Even up roll by stretching slightly.

Cut roll into 1" slices. Place in greased 13"x 9" pan or 18 greased muffin cups. Cover and let rise until double, 35 to 40 minutes. Heat oven to 375 degrees. Bake 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 1 1/2 dozen.

18. Single Pastry Shell, 2 variations - 8 or 9 inch one crust pie

1 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup plus 1 tablespoon hydrogenated shortening
2 tablespoons water

Measure and mix flour and salt in bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until particles are size of peas. Sprinkle with water, 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing with fork, until flour is moistened. Gather dough together with fingers so it cleans bowl. Press into ball. Turn out on lightly floured cloth-covered board.

Prepare rolling pin by covering with stockinet. Flour rubbed into covered board and stockinet keep dough from sticking, yet is not taken up by dough. Flatten with hand, roll out not quite 1/8" thick. Roll lightly, being careful not to add extra flour as that makes pastry tough. Keep rounding edge of pastry. If it begins to break, pinch broken edges together immediately.

Keep pastry circular and roll about 1" larger around than the inverted pie pan. Fold pastry in half. Carefully, transfer to pie pan. Unfold and ease pastry loosely into pan, being careful not to stretch. Stretching causes pastry to shrink during baking. Trim pastry with scissors 1/2" from edge of pan. Fold pastry under, even with pan. Form a fluted edge by firmly placing the right index finger on the inside of rim, left thumb and index finger on outside of pastry at that point. Pinch. Repeat all around pie. Sharpen points by pinching each one firmly. Hook points under pan rim to help prevent shrinking during baking. Prick pie shell. Bake at 475 degrees 8 to 10 minutes. Cool. Fill with cream or chiffon-type filling or other refrigerated fillings. Finish according to recipe.

18. Single Pastry Shell, 2 variations (Easy Flaky Pie Crust)

3 cups flour
1 1/2 cups shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt
5 tablespoons cool water
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 egg

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine flour, shortening and salt, mix well. In another bowl, mix together water, vinegar and egg. Combine mixtures and mix lightly with fork. Roll out and put in pie pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

NOTE: This can be rolled out several times and still comes out tender and flaky. Yield: 4 single pie crusts or 2 double.

Goats originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to attend the fair or exhibition.

Goats originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for goats originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Sheep_Goats/index.aspx

All goats shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan**) must have an import permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: Each animal attending a fair or exhibition must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import,. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state of origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.

Registration papers to be presented to superintendent before showing. Age shall be determined as of the opening date of the fair. No animals with horns can be shown unless full natural horns are standard for a specific breed.

1. An EXHIBITOR'S HERD shall consist of one doe under one year, one yearling doe, and one doe 2 years or older, all owned by the same exhibitor.
2. A SENIOR GET OF SIRE shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor, but all shall be in the senior age group.
3. A JUNIOR GET OF SIRE shall consist of 3 does under 2 years that have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals shall be owned by a single exhibitor.
4. A PRODUCE OF DAM shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor.

Rules Governing Exhibits

Entries must be made in name of actual owner.

PLEASE NOTE: The 4-H Poultry Committee will provide Pullorum-Typhoid testing for exhibitors June 25th from 9:00 – 11:30 a.m.; and June 30th from 5:00 a.m. – 7:30 p.m. at Polk County Fair Park in the poultry building. You must bring your birds to one of these test dates.

Poultry originating from within Wisconsin

All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

Poultry originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for poultry originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Poultry/index.aspx.

All poultry and game birds entering Wisconsin must originate from flocks that are enrolled in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program in the state of origin. The birds must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent and it must state that the poultry and game birds originate from flocks that are classified U.S. Pullorum typhoid-clean under NPIP or an equivalent program in the state of origin. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with

documentation of a negative test for Pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

Proper precaution will be taken to guard against accident or loss, but in no case will the Fair Society be responsible for loss or accident from any cause whatsoever. It is suggested exhibitors padlock cages except on judging day.

The State Department of Agriculture, or the fair or show management, reserves the right to have an approved veterinarian examine all fowl, and to exclude any fowl at any time for cause. Any exhibit excluded will be returned to the owner, or slaughtered, at the option of the attending veterinarian, or the State Department of Agriculture. If slaughtered, any return from the sale of the birds will be remitted directly to the owner.

All fowl exhibited may be subject to quarantine and slaughtered if any infectious or contagious disease is discovered among any of the fowl in the exhibit.

Exhibitors to furnish feed for birds and metal or glass containers for feed and water.

AWARDS

All awards will be made by comparison to the American Standard of Perfection. No exhibit will be given a prize unless worthy of same.

Cockerels, pullets, young males and young females are defined as birds hatched in current year. Exhibitors and visitors will positively be prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the owners.

Cage rent is \$.50 cents per cage.

Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state of origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.
